Three Decades of Experience

When SRF was created, there was no solid plan. There was no model to learn from. We had to step slowly and test what would work, such at: What restrictions adopters were willing to accept? Where would the funds come from? What would race horse owners be willing to do for the horses? How would we make sure adopted homes kept up the good care and how would that be tracked? What if horses came back at unadoptable ages? What were we to do with the sore and lame horses, which, we were right, would be in abundance. How would we change the stigma that they only pace? The list went on and on.

Had we waited to sort it all out, thousands of these trotters & pacers would have never had the chance to live on. There were few answers at the time, and some answers are still missing. What we do know is that there are too many horses in need. What we have learned is:

- The two most popular homes by far, for Standardbreds through SRF, are for trail riding, and as a family horse and pet.
- The number of sound horses in need of a home is so small it is insignificant. They are racehorses, people want to race them until they cant hold up to it.
- Horses need guardians, then the slaughter may stop.



- Suspensory issues are the number one cause of lameness among the horses SRF helps.
- Horses are affected by so much that has nothing to do with them, kids growing up, divorce, illness, moving, employment, death, and new hobbies.
- Every organization is different and that is grossly misunderstood.
- The Standardbred is the ideal breed for therapy programs.
- Breaking them to the saddle takes putting the saddle on.
- Committed volunteers rock!
- Claiming races do not take into consideration the welfare of the horses. People are compelled to patch up injuries and send them back to race because they can lose them in a claim. Why invest in proper care?
- We wish folks could see the development in a horse from age 3 to 5. This would change the structure of racing.
- Horses change lives, by far for the better.
- We can always pick out an offspring of Direct Scooter by the little ears!
- Pacers are easier to train to canter then trotters, and when under saddle, we catch them snoozing.
- Many Standardbreds fall asleep when just standing around under saddle.
- Some people have traded their heart for money, some their money for their heart, SRF has proof.
- Standardbreds coming from the rural communities tell us that few, if any, know anything about hoof care. Most of their horses, if not all, are standing high heels like Stilettos or are stuck in earth shoes from the 1960's.
- When one is struggling to put weight on a horse it is almost always because the horse just needs more groceries.
- It takes about a month for a horse coming from a bad situation to recover their personality, and it is so cool to watch.
- A horse desperate to get out of somewhere will bow it's head to fit on a small trailer.
- There are IO sides to every story so go directly to the horse and his veterinarian for the truth.
- Standardbreds coming from the rural communities indicate that few, if any, know a thing about oral care.
- Too many people think it is okay to fudge the truth, and some people believe themselves.
- Generally if you are a "cow" person you see horses as hay burners.
- We all should have been designed with several ears, two are not enough.
- Standardbreds off the track and training centers will rarely go on to the show ring due to injuries limiting use, but the few that do shine as brightly as other breeds.

SRF has its own policies and procedures based on these 30 years. Experience is so valuable and that contributes widely to its stellar program. Only 8% of SRF's financial support comes from harness racing organizations, it's the kindness of individuals that changes the lives of these majestic animals.

Did You Know

Anyone can find a horse a home, but that doesn't mean the horse won't need several more or won't be at risk for slaughter at a later time. Based on the data SRF compiled from January I, 1992 - March II, 2019 only 8.5% of the horses will live out their lives in their first home.

Omitted from the data are:

- Horses that were never adopted, likely due to age or injury and were retired with SRF until deceased;
- Horses presently under the expense of SRF, not likely to be adopted;
- Horses presently available for adoption.

The number of horses this data is based on is 1692.

91.5% needed more than one home. 49.0% had 2 homes 20.0% had 3 homes 10.5% had 4 homes A few had as many as II homes.

So what is really being accomplished when a person or a charity finds a home for a horse? Without guardianship, it's a sideway move, the horse is safe for now but likely that will come to an end and then what? Guardianship is the greatest need of these animals.

SRF estimates that about 8% of the Standardbreds they find in kill pens had the good fortune of their owner or trainer finding them a home, but guardianship was not attached. It also finds about 5% of the Standardbred horses found in kill pens were once adopted out by charities that also did not attach guardianship, some just offered "first right of refusal," some relinquished ownership. Every home is different, every charity is different.

SRF will never stop needing you behind them, it's how it can get help to horses in need quickly; it can provide for those passed over by adopters due to age or injury; can follow-up every adopted horse semi-annually; and is able to be there should an adopted horse need a new home. We have it all covered and your support is what makes it all happen.
